



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

Thank you for purchasing this game! The beginning of the year is a time for ice breakers and get to know you games. This is a simple, quick game you can use when you need a transition, you need to get them moving, or just need something fun to do. I did it with my students and I found they just wanted to play it over and over again! The math part is for younger grades- there are 2 versions of the game. The first is just recognizing numbers/sets of dots and then matching it to a numeral on the page. The second set is to roll 2 dice and add the numbers together. Of course, even if the math is simple, kids can still play and break the ice to get them talking.

How to play:

*You will need one sheet and one (or two) die per pair/group of kids (however you want to group them!)

Kids take turns, rolling the dice. **When it is their turn to roll, they are asking their partner the question.** Whatever they roll, they ask only that question. For example, if they roll 3, they look up 3 on the page, ask the question, and listen to their partner answer. This is a time I talk about looking in the eyes of the speaker, rephrase what they said (older kids), and show interest in their response. Come back together as a class and have the students share what they learned about their partner. You could even turn it into a writing activity where they write about what they learned about their partner! 😊


